Headbourne Worthy Annual Litter Pick Saturday 5th March from 10.30am





Meet at Marlands on London Road just past the end of Bedfield Lane on Saturday 5th March for our annual village clean-up, kindly hosted by Christine and Bevis Clarke-Smith. Coffee and biscuits are available before we send you off in small teams and family groups, with bags, litter picking sticks and high-visibility waistcoats to scour the hedgerows and byways for litter. This annual event is slightly earlier than usual to coincide with the national 'Clean for the Queen' campaign, aimed at really tackling the national disgrace that is the state of our roadsides, in time for the Queen's 90th birthday later this year.

Motorists and their passengers are increasingly the guilty parties for this roadside littering, and anybody throwing litter out of a car is reminded that they are liable to an $\pounds 80$ on the spot fine, and persistent litter bugs can be prosecuted in the courts and even imprisoned. New rules mean that roads with speed limits over 40mph have to have lane closures to protect workmen who are clearing up litter, making the process even more difficult and expensive for local authorities.



The speed limit along the entire length of **Springvale Road** will officially be reduced to 30mph from 7th March. This follows a long campaign by local residents and latterly the support of the Kings Worthy Parish Council.



Pound Road Doctor's Surgery back under threat of closure

The Friarsgate Practice has failed in its bid to build a new Medical Centre jointly with other local doctors. A 'drop-in session' on their renewed proposals to close the current surgery in Kings Worthy will be on Saturday 5th March from 10am - 12 noon at their Weeke surgery.

We hope this will make it more likely that people will keep to the 30mph limit through Headbourne Worthy. We should ensure that we, as local residents, always lead by example and stick to 30mph or less!

Winchester City Council Elections 5th May

On Thursday 5th May, Winchester City Council elections will be held. This year, because of ward boundary changes. and a reduction in the number of councillors from 57 to 45, all councillors' seats are up for election. As a result of the boundary changes, Headbourne Worthy has moved back to a ward which incudes Kings Worthy. We have been part of the Sparsholt Ward (along with Crawley), and our elected representative has been Cllr Caroline Horrill. We must say farewell to Caroline, and we thank her for her service to our community. As of May we will be part of the new threemember Worthys Ward, which includes Kings Worthy, Abbots Worthy, and Worthy Down. Doubtless information on candidates will be forthcomina.

Local Housing Need?

Do you know of a local family struggling to afford private rents, or somebody who would love to return to their roots but is unable to afford the cost of buying or renting in Headbourne Worthy?

The Parish Council is exploring an opportunity to work in partnership with Winchester Housing Trust to build a small development of rental and shared ownership social housing, exclusively fior people with a local connection to Headbourne Worthy. The properties will be of a high quality and will be sensitively



designed to fit in with the rural village location.

"What if?

A train came off the rails? A wing fell off an overflying 'plane? There was a long power outage? There was a flood or pestillence, or a plague of frogs? - What if?

What if "the authorities" had to evacuate houses or areas? Where would those people go? How would they be fed? If you are able-bodied you might be able to cope, but what about vulnerable people?. However unlikely an event might seem, or however far fetched the proposition, someone would look after us wouldn't they? And if they didn't we would jolly well make our views known on the lack of planning or anticipation - wouldn't we?

However, to some degree, the buck stops here; in our community. The Government believes in the benefits of Community Resilience and we have seen examples of it in the floods in Cumbria and Lancashire at the start of the year. The Hampshire and Isle of Wight Community Resilience Forum brings together the three main emergency responders and a host of second tier organisations who can offer assistance or experience and trained personel to respond quickly to unfolding emergencies. However skilled these people are, and no matter how hard they plan and train for emergencies they cannot know every community, every street, every house and the location of every vulnerable person. This is local knowledge which we all have, and which, in an emergency is valuable information to those responding on our behalf.

In essence, every community is encouraged to have an emergency community response plan to help deal with whatever may befall us. This plan is stored in "the cloud" (remotely) and is available to the three main responders, and the County and City Councils, to help them with their weak spot local knowledge. This is not about dealing with the incident - this is about the important, vital, background assistance the community can provide.

As much as I admire my fellow Councillors for their sagacity, energy and dedication, I think they would agree that they are not the only, or perhaps the best people to work on a plan - this is a village issue. There is amongst the Community, I am sure, people with current job skills and knowledge, or retired skills, or knowledge of responding to or caring for people, or who know how to brew some tea, who could join a working party to help the village prepare such an emergency plan.

Our annual meeting in May will see the launch of a working party - will you, can you, help the community in this project? Why not let Lisa know of your interest and we can keep you in touch with progress." Harry Whorwood, Parish Chairman
