Housing in Headbourne Worthy

Headbourne Worthy Parish Council is currently exploring an opportunity to work in partnership with Winchester Housing Trust to build a small development of rental and shared ownership social housing, exclusively for people with a local connection to Headbourne Worthy.

While it is often younger people that we assume need help with housing, particularly those with children, this is not always the case. The Parish Council is keen to understand the full extent of local need, so if you know:

- someone who might want to live close to their work.
- someone who might like to stay in Headbourne Worthy, but by downsizing to a smaller or single-storey property
- someone who might want to move out of their parents' home

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Headbourne Parish Council Worthy

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Springvale Road has had the speed limit reduced to 30mph, but so far it has not noticeably reduced traffic speed. So what to do? Calling in the cops is the obvious answer and they have been as cooperative as they can be with reductions in their budget and manpower. We share a speed warning device which you may have seen flashing (as a pedestrian of course) and this does have a noticeable but limited effect.

One frustrated resident suggested we take the law into our own hands. So should we? If sufficient residents were of this view, why don't we have our own speed camera operated by residents? Maybe the human element would bring a different dimension to reminding drivers of the need to observe the limits. Ithen Abbas and Ovington PC have experience of this, so we have asked the

Chairman David Cook to come along to the meeting to tell us of his experiences in operating a camera device. Come along and join the debate.

I mentioned emergency planning in the last newsletter and Sheila Pearcey of Waterside Cottage has some experience of this and has volunteered to bring her expertise to bear and construct such a plan. Could you help her? It may be a small contribution which has a big effect on how we react to an emergency. Do you also have experience in this area, or could you assist us? Later this year we shall remember the Battle of the Somme some one hundred years after the event with the refurbishment of the war memorial; another achievement of the Parish Council this year.
